Spring is in the Air

Spring is in the air and it's time to think of gardens and all things outdoors. A visit to the Forget-Me-Not greenhouse in rural Gary will soon be in order. The licensed nursery was started in 1999 by Joyce and Wesley Shepherd and family. The goal was to replace income from their farm dairy as dairy prices were declining. It has grown to include five individual greenhouses filled with plants and seedlings. Joyce has a degree in horticulture, specifically landscaping, from SDSU in Brookings, SD so this was a great fit. But would customers travel out to the farm for their greenhouse needs? The answer is "yes!" Customers come primarily from Gary, Madison, and Dawson but some come from as far as the Cities and Sioux Falls and further if they have family in the area.



The plants they provide include annual flowers and vegetables, along with some fruits such as grapes, raspberries, and strawberries. In the past, they have also offered gooseberries and currants. They also sell perennials which will grow back each year. Most of the vegetables are started from seed as are some flowers such as the marigolds for bedding plants. The beautiful geraniums that Joyce is known for come started as plugs which are then transplanted and carefully tended to become great additions to planters and patio pots. Forget-Me-Not greenhouse sells approximately 70% flowers and 30% vegetables.

Greenhouse work begins around the middle of February and the business is open from the last week of April until the end of June. Joyce puts in at least 60 hours a week during the season and has help from her family with replanting and watering of the plants.

The kids help in the greenhouses after completing their schoolwork as they are homeschooled. Wesley is mechanically minded (like most all farmers) and keeps the equipment running. The greenhouses are heated with a combination of corn burning stoves and propane heaters. One benefit of the corn stove is reduced humidity which helps to eliminate fungus in the greenhouses. Their operation is not automated so requires a lot of hands-on work.



The Forget-Me-Not greenhouse is located northeast of Gary – <u>From Gary</u>, head 2 miles east to Hauger's corner on YMC 4, turn north, drive 6 miles north on YMC 15 which turns into LQPC 7, follow the signs from there. Or <u>from Canby</u>, head west on MN 68 to the Burr corner, turn north, and drive 12 miles on YMC 14 which becomes LQPC 9, then look for the signs. You'll turn west and drive for about 2.25 miles to reach the greenhouse.

The nursery hours are Monday to Friday 9AM to 7PM; Saturday 9AM to 5PM and closed on Sunday. Local support is crucial for small businesses in our rural area, plus with the rising grocery costs, now is the perfect time to take up gardening.

In a few short weeks, garden centers were sold out of seeds, seedlings, fruit trees and root stock. Gardening is a great ideabecause it is one of the healthiest hobbies you can "cultivate."

Some benefits of gardening -

- 1. Photosynthesis is the process where plants make their own food from sunlight. So do you and I. Our skin uses sunlight to make vitamin D which helps to strengthen our bones and immune system and reduces the risk of certain cancers and dementia.
- 2. Heart Health-Aerobic exercises from digging, hoeing, harvesting, and hauling strengthen heart health. Gardening also increases physical strength.
- 3. Mood boosting Reduces stress and combats loneliness. Increased socialization when working a community garden.
- 4. Family activity- good for all ages from toddlers to seniors.
- 5. Healthier food control over what seeds you grow and what soil improvements or chemicals you use on your garden.




WHO can attend: Anyone age 21 and older.
