A Farmer's Best Friend

The 100th South Dakota Legislative session will be held in January of this year. The very first session of the South Dakota Legislature was convened in Pierre on October 15, 1889, a full two weeks before South Dakota was admitted to the Union. Initially, the legislature met biannually, thus only 100 sessions in 136 years. Gary has a connection to that very first legislative session -Millard Fillmore Greeley, a leading farmer and stockman from north of town. Greeley was born in Kennebec County, Maine on November 6, 1851 to Levi M. and Beulah Alden Greeley. By 1860, the family had migrated west to Wisconsin where M.F. Greeley grew to adulthood. He attended the common schools only, with the exception of being a student for a short time in Northwestern University. In his boyhood and early manhood he worked on farms, in the pineries, at river driving, surveying, etc., and when twenty-one years of age, was given charge of a crew of eighty men to cut the right of way north to Lake Superior for the Wisconsin Central Railway. The Greeleys were farmers by trade and the younger Greeley homesteaded forty acres in Waushara County, WI, receiving his patent in 1881. He was married to Agnes Blair on December 29, 1877 in Wisconsin and one son, Ronda, was born in Wisconsin before the entire family again migrated west, arriving in Glenwood Township of Deuel County in 1882. They purchased land in and around what became known as Greeley Gulch, two and a half miles northwest of Gary. A second son, Benjamin Alden was born in South Dakota. They also cared for several adopted children and gave homes to others.



M.F. Greeley was a civic minded individual who actively promoted agriculture in the area, proving that Deuel County could be successfully developed for livestock farming especially the raising of sheep. Mr. Greeley was widely known throughout the northwest as an effective worker for agricultural advancement and also earned a considerable reputation as a speaker at Chautauqua



gatherings. similar He and established and developed his ranch, raising large numbers of sheep and advocating for the advancement of agriculture. Greeley was the first secretary and later president of the South Dakota Wool Growers' Association and served as the secretary of the Deuel County Agricultural Society which organized the County Fair in Gary. He was active in the Farmer's Institute of the Agricultural College at Brookings, a member of the local school board and a county commissioner in the



1880's before serving in the State House from 1889 to 1896 when he moved to the State Senate. He was considered for both the governorship of the state and the US Senate at that time and was appointed to the South Dakota Board of Regents and served at the time of the establishment of the State School at Gary. A writer of more than ordinary ability, Greeley wrote a column on sheep and wool production as well as occasional editorial columns for The Farmer magazine published in Huron and Aberdeen. Following the untimely death of the editor, William F. T. Bushnell, in 1900, M.F. Greeley took the helm of the publication for 12 years. During this time, the Deuel County farms were sold and the entire family (mother Beulah, brothers Guilford, Millard, and

Levi I, and their families) moved to Wadena, MN and on to Washington state by 1920. Greeley worked as the associate editor of The Farmer magazine while living in Puyallup, Washington until his death in 1928. He was the "farmer's best friend" throughout his life.

No Greeley descendants remain in the Gary area, though several family members are laid to rest in the Grandview Cemetery.

History of the Wrestling Match Between Frank Banwarth and Reinhart Stellmacher

On January 1914, at Gary, South Dakota (Match Won by Frank Banwarth)

Written by David M. Banwarth (Grandson of Frank Banwarth) - August 25, 2024

I wrote this because it is an interesting piece of Gary history that might otherwise be lost to time. This is the story of perhaps the most famous wrestling match to ever occur in Gary, happening in January of 1914. This account includes an actual annotated photo and is also based on the oral history of Robert Banwarth (my father) as told to me many years ago.

There were two blacksmiths in Gary at the time (1914), William Banwarth (my Great Grandfather) and Reinhart Stellmacher. William Banwarth's Blacksmith Shop was on Summit Street, next to his house (and next to the site of the Banwarth Garage) on the east end of town. "Stellmacher's" was located on the west end, behind where the Red Owl store building was located. My grandfather, Frank Banwarth, was a son of William Banwarth and was one of the competitors in the match.

While I do not know exactly what led up to the match, the family oral history states that one day Reinart challenged Frank Banwarth to a wrestling match in town, to be attended by the townsfolk. Frank agreed, so long as that once there was a pin by one of them, the match was over.

Reinart was significantly larger and older than Frank, at 36 years old. He was very strong, being a blacksmith. Frank, age 22, was very quick and was strong as well, working with his blacksmith father and performing heavy equipment mechanical repairs. The match took place in January of 1914 (day unknown). A photo taken after the match to commemorate it shows those attending, along with the two wrestlers (pictured in the middle, second row).

According to handwritten notes on the back of the family photo, some of those in attendance are listed below. The handwriting is not entirely legible. Only 17 shown in the photo are named by the handwriting. Some of the illegible names have had the spelling verified using the 1910 Federal Census data of Deuel County.



Frank Banwarth (arms folded, 2nd row, light colored arms, middle, sitting) and Reinhart Stellmacher (next to Frank on right, dark shirt, mustache), along with townsfolk in attendance. The upcoming match became a much-anticipated event, and at least 34 attended.

According to family oral history, the match was unexpectedly short. Frank knew that Reinhart was physically stronger and much larger, so he needed to avoid a contest of simply brute strength as best he could. Frank relied on his relative smallness and quickness as an advantage. When the match started, Frank rushed at Reinhart quickly and moved to secure the winning pin after not much time had elapsed. Frank had won, surprising his larger opponent.

Frank went on to build the Banwarth Garage (AKA "City Garage"), where he operated the automotive, tractor, implement business until his death in 1950, unexpectedly, at only 57 years of age, while undergoing surgery. Reinhart Stellmacher passed away in 1951 at age 73. They are both buried in Grandview Cemetery in Gary. Both were well liked gentlemen and businessmen in Gary. They were friends after the match for many years. My father (Robert Banwarth) told me that as a boy (in the 1920's) he would go to Stellmacher's to get free bits of carbide to use in his toy cannon and that "Mr. Stellmacher" was very kind to him and the other kids as well.



Back of photo, showing handwritten names of some of those in attendance (very dark and difficult to read).






