Memorial Day- a day of remembrance for those men and women who have given their lives in service to our country. This Memorial Day we remember PFC. Bruce H. Lytle, who fell in battle in France during World War II.

"Bruce Lytle was a good-looking, short, dark complexioned, blueeved guy of about 5'8". He was from South Dakota, and he was married. He and I were good friends. He was quiet and not real

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talkative. Bruce was killed in Normandy. I remember we had to cross a small field under machine gun fire. I got across and looked back and there were many guys down on the ground.

At first, I thought they had dropped to the ground to escape the gunfire, and I yelled to come on, but then, realization came to me that they either were injured or dead. Bruce Lytle, my good buddy and co-explorer, was dead. Bruce was one of those shot when he crossed this field." - Lawrence Wilson Hays, who served with Bruce and wrote this in an autobiography compiled by his niece Kay McConathy Murray.

The invasion of Normandy took place on June 6, 1944. Allied troops launched a massive landing of nearly 160,000 troops on the beaches of Normandy. The battle resulted in significant

casualties on both sides, with the Allies suffering heavy losses, especially during the initial landings on Omaha Beach. The Battle of Normandy culminated with the liberation of Paris in late August. It was a major turning point in World War II.

Bruce Howard Lytle was born at Gary, South Dakota on March 14, 1920, to William and Dora Lytle. He attended rural schools and two years of high school before leaving school. He was farming with his father northwest of Gary in Glenwood Township when he enlisted in the Army on April 1, 1942. He was married to Lucille Hall on October 26, 1942, in Taylor, TX and their son, Bruce William, was born in South Dakota on May 26, 1944. PFC Bruce H. Lytle died in battle in Normandy, France on July 4, 1944. His remains were returned from France for interment in Grandview Cemetery on May 23, 1948.

The Gary Methodist church was well filled Sunday afternoon for the military funeral and burial service of Pfc. Bruce Lytle, whose body had been brought from France to America for interment at the Gary cemetery.

Rev. Albert Hartt spoke at the funeral service, and Maynard Cochrane sang two selections, Mrs. D. C. Gould being planist.

The members of the Peden-Cole post of the American Legion were in charge of the colors, firing squad, and Donald Eng sounded Taps.

Bruce, a son of Mrs. Dora Lytle of St. Paul, former Gary residents, was a victim of wer in France on July 4, 1944.

The Legion color bearers were Dale Kluckman and Elmer Hinsvark and color guards were Sonny Hinsvark and Aloysius Miller. The firing squad was composed of Loue F. Lehnertz. Francis Schuttler, Bud Anderson, Arnold Stefferud, Roy Norton, Bud Jesme, Robert Glese, Darold Heimberger, and Harry Eugene Schulte, sergeant.

The pallbearers were Grant Snyder, I. M. "Ding" Hinsvark, Chris Lovaas, Donald Sheehan, George Meinberg, and Lee Volk, all of Gary.

*Interesting things are discovered when I get handed a photo or an artifact from Gary's history.

This photo below came from the Lund Hoel House collection at MECCA - the Museum Encompassing Canby Community Area in Canby, MN. Let's see what I have discovered.

The First National Bank

The First National Bank of Gary, South Dakota was organized on March 1, 1909 and chartered on April 19, 1909. It succeeded the State Bank of Gary and opened for business on May 5, 1909. Another bank, the National Bank of Gary, South Dakota, had been organized as a conversion of the existing earlier Exchange Bank and was operating between 1916 and 1931



when it was absorbed by the First National Bank. The First National Bank went into conservatorship on March 24, 1933 and then into receivership on December 11, 1933. It did not reopen.

The first president of the First National Bank of Gary was John Swenson, a very influential man in the Canby area. He served as president from 1909 until 1913. Other presidents were John A. Thronson 1914-1922, Samuel Lewison 1923-1930, and Daniel Torkelson Beiningen 1931-1932. The cashiers were Theordore Michael Antony 1909-1914, Ernest Bismark Lewison

1915-1917, and Fred Elmer Ovrom 1918-1932. Note about John Swenson: he was involved with early banks in Dawson, Hendricks, Ivanhoe, Minneota, Canby, Porter, St. Leo and Madison MN as well as Toronto, Clear Lake and Gary SD to name just a few.

The National Banking Act of 1863 and 1864 aimed to create a stable banking system with a uniform national currency of bank notes backed by government bonds.

Key reasons for the establishment of national bank charters were-

- 1. Financing the Civil War and raising money for the Union Army by requiring the national banks to purchase government bonds.
- 2. Establishing a stable banking system with uniform rules and supervision by the Federal government.
- 3.Economic growth by providing a reliable banking system and stable currency, it would support economic growth and development.
- 4. Preempting state laws National banks operating under federal laws would take precedence over state laws. This would benefit banks with operations in several states as it minimized the impact of varying state regulations.



Photo dated 1911 - The building with the arches is the First National Bank before it was torn down and rebuilt in 1917. Today, it is the home of Rob's Locker and Catering and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places due to its architectural significance.



Notice the signature of T.M. Antony and the signature stamp of John Swenson. This bank note was known as a Series 1902 Date Back. These large notes measured 7 3/8 by 3 1/8 inches quite a difference to today's bills that measure 6.14 inches in length and 2.61 inches in width, about 25% smaller. The large bank notes were known for their extensive artwork and designs.

A New Home.

The First National Bank will commence the erection of a building on July first. building now occupied by the the bank will be torn down and a new one erected.

The new building will be 24x63 feet in size, with a 14 foot ceil-The material used will be fireproof brick and The entrance will be in stone. the center with plenty of lobby room, and fine spacious rooms in the rear. A full basement will be under the building, and a heating plant installed. vault will extend from the basement, and there will be vault. room below for the safe keeping, of papers.

The building is to be completed in ninety days, and while the work is in progress the bank will occupy quarters in the Gary Investment Company's building. The building will be a handsome and modern structure. A Mossman & Co. of St. Paul, are the

builders.

The officers were Anton Walden, Pres.; S.R. Law, V. Pres.; E.L. Lohr, Cashier; and John E. Thoelke, Asst. Cashier. It sat on the corner of first Ave. and Coteau St. for many years (where the Wells Store had been located prior to the 1908 fire) and moved to its new location across the street in 1982. The bank was purchased by the **Security State Bank** of Madison, SD in January of 1992. On January 2, 1996 it became a branch of **Deuel County National Bank** of Clear Lake. later known as **DNB National Bank**.

Early Gary, South Dakota banks –

The first bank in Deuel County was the **Deuel** County Bank in Gary, established in 1880 with Irving A. Sibley as President and C.L. Shelly as Cashier. It sat where the Odd Fellows building was later constructed.

The **Bank of Gary**, the second bank in our town, was established in 1884 by Benjamin A. and Newton M. Wade, both early doctors in the community. It sat on the east side of Coteau Street and was burned in the 1908 fire.

The Exchange Bank was formed in 1891 by A.L. Houghton, Ashley Houghton, Lottie Houghton, and others. It became the National Bank of Gary, South **Dakota** in 1916 and was later absorbed by the **First** National Bank in 1931.

State Bank of Gary - started by J.G. Lund in 1901. It became the **First National Bank** in 1909.

The Gary State Bank - was chartered on January 2, 1945.

Rebuilding the First National Bank June 22, 1917, Gary Interstate,

First National Bank.

As all other lines of business increase, and as the farmers come to use the banks more and more, the State Bank of Gary has found it to be necessary to also increase its facilities, and with this end in view was, Wednesday morning transformed into a National bank. The capital stock has been increased to \$25,000, and all arrangements are completed change. The officers will remain the same as heretofore.


